

HNR 351: Honors Senior Project/Thesis Development

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## **Course Objectives and Goals**

The goals of HNR 351 (Thesis Development) differ from those of HNR 325 (Thesis Orientation). Whereas the earlier class aimed to help you choose and refine a topic, discuss different thesis genres (creative, scholarly, pedagogical, scientific, hybrid) and—most important—create a successful thesis proposal, this class will ask you to:

- 1. Complete and revise a mind map and annotated outline.
- 2. Dedicate yourself to doing significant thesis research especially the sources from your annotated bibliography
- 3. Learn about the rationale for, and purpose of, a literature review
- 4. Begin writing at least one important section of your thesis:
  - a. Most of you (scholarly/scientific theses) will write a literature review
  - b. Some of you (creative theses) might write the expository/reflective section and/or your opening pages
  - c. Others of you (pedagogical/hybrid/experiential projects) might complete other contextualization sections, per consultation with me.

## **Grade Calculation & Attendance Policy**

If you *satisfactorily* complete #1, #2, and #4 above, you *should* receive an "A" for this course. HOWEVER, as in HNR 325, *effort* is as important as *product*. Lower effort will result in lower

grades. Please don't make me nag you, and please don't fall behind. A recurrent theme this term will be accepting responsibility for YOUR projects. As in HNR 325, your own work will be the primary text for this class, supplemented by student work from past years. **NOTE:** Any more than two unexcused absences will result in a half-letter final grade reduction.
